The Miller-Grassie Award for Outstanding Leadership in Education

Queensland Catholic Education Commission The Miller-Grassie Award and President's Citation acknowledges and perpetuates the memory of the life and work of educational researchers and administrators, Dr Laurie Miller and Associate Professor MacCrae Grassie. Miller and Grassie were instrumental in establishing the Queensland Institute of Education Administrators (OIEA) in 1972, the forerunner to ACEL.

The recipient of this prestigious award is an outstanding educational leader whose achievements and influence reflect the spirit of the work of these pioneering educational leaders.

Dr Lee-Anne Perry's appointment as Executive Director of the Queensland Catholic Education Commission in 2015 followed a long career in school leadership and teaching including over 25 years' experience as a principal of schools. QCEC is the system authority and peak advocacy and policy body for Catholic schools in Queensland.

In her current role, Dr Perry works collaboratively with other sector leaders from government and independent schools to shape policy and practice for all young people in Queensland from early years to post-school pathways. Her other current leadership roles include Deputy Chair of the National Catholic Education Commission, member of the Australian Schools Policy Group which leads national education policy development, member of the Queensland University of Technology Council, Honorary Professor of the Australian Catholic University, and Board member of the Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority and Non-State Schools Accreditation Board. Dr Perry has contributed extensively to a range of professional, representative, expert and consultative groups including the Through Growth to Achievement review led by David Gonski and the Queensland Government Anti-Cyberbullying Taskforce.

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The Excellence in Educational Leadership Award



Sharon Collins

The Excellence in Educational Leadership Award recognises extraordinary educational leadership resulting in enhanced student outcomes. Nominees are educators or a group of educators working in classrooms, faculties, schools, tertiary institutions, school boards, systems or consultancies. The nominees lead the implementation of educational initiatives and/or influence educational policy.

As Principal of St Saviour's College, Sharon Collins has made an outstanding contribution to educational leadership in a highly diverse environment. Under her guidance, St Saviour's has become regarded as a high-performing school with everimproving academic results and high enrolment growth. In 2019 St Saviour's was recognised as the third most improved school in Queensland for performance in NAPLAN. Enrolment growth has increased significantly under her leadership, at an average annual rate of 26% across the past three years. With 26% indigenous population, and 24% of students from a language background other than English, St Saviour's attracts students from Papua New Guinea and throughout Queensland and New South Wales, especially from the communities in the far north and western Queensland. Sharon's leadership of a diverse community, grounded in her inherent belief in the value of education for all students, has attracted much interest from leadership teams throughout the state and nationally.



The Excellence in Educational Leadership Award

Before assuming the role of Principal of St Joseph's College in 2020, Kort Goodman spent four years as Principal of Assumption College in Warwick and before this, 15 years in the roles of teacher, sports coordinator, deputy principal, and acting principal in schools across Western Queensland and the Darling Downs. His collaborative leadership, along with expert development and implementation of strategic actions and high yield strategies, empowers staff to be leaders in their areas. Through this work, Kort has led significant and measurable improvements in student learning. As a result of Kort's educational, staff and community leadership, school leaders and teachers have reported positive changes in teacher collegiality, as well as individual and collective efficacy. Kort's collaborative engagement with staff in leadership positions has empowered these leaders to strive for excellence in key areas, such as clearly articulating expectations around performance, ensuring accountability, and aligning professional learning to enhance capacity.

Assistant Regional Director Department of Education, South East As Assistant Regional Director of the Department of Education, South East Region, Bronwyn Johnstone partners with state schools to deliver on 'every student succeeding'. Prior to this, she was the Principal of Boonah State High school and Capalaba State College, where she built staff capability and improved student achievement through strong partnerships. As an accomplished educator, she attributes collaboration as the key to creating a culture of learning and improving together. Bronwyn is most proud of her work with the Leading Learning Collaborative (LLC), a partnership with 99 schools who, through research, are committed to building and embedding high quality, self-sustaining instructional leadership. Combining school and regional teams, Bronwyn focuses on improving learning through monitoring and measuring impact using systemic data. Bronwyn actively contributes to the education conversation with published articles and conference presentations. Additionally, in creating the LLC Journal, she provides authorship opportunities for principals to learn with, and from, one another.

Department of Education, Central Queensland Region Kay Kirkman is the Acting Regional Director, Department of Education, Central Queensland Region, a region encompassing 190 schools. Kay commenced her role as Assistant Regional Director in 2014 having held former roles as Performance Measurement Officer, Principal Advisor Education Services, Deputy Principal and Principal. During her time as Deputy Principal, Kay was recognised with an Australia Day Achievement Award for her contributions to teaching and learning and a State Best Practice Award for her Year 2 Net Intervention Model. Regionally, Kay initiated and developed the Southern CQ Assessment and Moderation Professional Learning Community (PLC), influencing teaching, learning and assessment in Central Queensland clusters and schools. Her leadership and development of the Gladstone Reading PLC, co-designed with the State Reading and Writing Centre has also impacted the leadership of intentional collaboration and the teaching of reading across the state. Kay is also an inaugural member of the state ARD/Lead Principal Advisory Group.

Director: Teaching and Learning Toowoomba Catholic Schools After successful principalships across Queensland, in 2017, Jim Midgley accepted the role as a Director in Toowoomba Catholic Schools, overseeing Teaching and Learning in 31 schools and some 10 000 students. His journey as an educational leader includes Principal at Rockhampton Diocese schools, an international school in Port Moresby, a large Primary school and a P-12 college in the Brisbane Diocese. Jim's 25 years in educational leadership have been based on the philosophy that building teacher capacity through nurturing collective efficacy is the way forward for educational reform. He has ensured that Toowoomba is the highest performing diocese in early years reading in Australia, and has enabled consistently highquality evidence-based practices in reading instruction across all classrooms and schools. After receiving an ACEL Excellence in Educational Leadership Award, lim has subsequently been consistently visible and highly supportive of the work of the Toowoomba Regional ACEL group.

Research in Educational Leadership and Management Award

ACELQ promotes the principles and practices of good educational leadership through partnerships with universities and tertiary institutions. Post Graduate students are nominated by their universities for exceptional academic achievement in advanced studies in educational leadership.

Nominated by Griffith University

As Regional Principal at One School Global, Dr Damien Barry is responsible for the oversight of four campuses in Queensland and two campuses in Tasmania where he has delivered the operational and strategic management of the development of curriculum, teaching, and learning with an emphasis on innovation and improving standards. He is the Chair of the National Teaching and Learning Team and has implemented the GROWTH Coaching framework with all Heads of Campus across Australia. Highlights of his school leadership have included using the findings from his doctoral studies to develop and implement a Teacher Performance and Development Framework across 35 campuses nationally and implementing diagnostic tests to 10,000 students across 135 campuses globally and then successfully using the data from these tests to inform practice. Dr Barry's thesis entitled *The value of the Australian Professional Standards* for teachers as an evaluation tool to enhance teacher quality received the prestigious Griffith Graduate Research School Award for Excellence in a Research Thesis.



Research in Educational Leadership and Management Award



Ashley Moor

Nominated by University of Queensland

Ashley Moor is the Manager of Educational Design at Pinnacle Safety and Training, a national RTO and one of Australia's largest providers of adult education. Having worked in primary, secondary and higher education environments for over 20 years Ashley's background is in language acquisition and academic literacies. His Masters research project: School leadership and quality assurance: A standards-based approach to principalship in Australia critically evaluated the extent to which the Principal Standards can assure quality leadership in Australian schools and offered key recommendations. His vast experience in the area of leadership and management has allowed him to contribute invaluably to the leadership field and to realise some of the key outcomes of the professional standards for teachers and principals. In his research into educational leadership, Ashley highlights the affective world, the importance of healthy learning communities and the paradoxes and tensions which arise as part of efforts to reform educational systems.

Dr Paul Teys has served independent education in Australia for over 40 years, including as Principal of Moreton Bay College and Hunter Valley Grammar School. His EdD Thesis found that the claims made in the literature about successful principal leadership only partially describe principal leadership in large, P-12, autonomous, independent schools in Australia. The most significant finding to emerge from this research is that effective principal leadership needs the principal to be able to diagnose their leadership context successfully and act in response. What has also emerged from the research is that being the principal of a large, P-12, autonomous, independent schools in Australia is a unique, complex and demanding role. One significant outcome of this research is the development of a leadership framework that appropriately represents the complexity of the role and responsibilities of a principal leading a large, P-12, autonomous, independent school in Australia.



The Inspiring Educator Award

English Coordinator Hillbrook Anglican School This award honours educators whose teaching skills, relationships with students and attitude towards their work have inspired young people to enter the profession of teaching. It provides the profession and the community with examples of teachers whose pride in the work they do, and their commitment to the ideals and goals of teaching have influenced others to follow in their footsteps.

Debbie Schuler started her teaching career over 35 years ago in North Queensland before returning to Brisbane to take on leadership roles in English teaching, eventually leading to her current role as English Coordinator at Hillbrook Anglican School. Through her work, Debbie, demonstrates great knowledge, refined and extensive skills and, above all, pervasive kindness and sensitivity to the particular needs of others, especially to individual learning needs. She is deeply respected for her expertise at balancing the notions of challenge and support for her students, providing care and compassion to each student and ultimately striving to make a positive difference in the lives of others. Debbie's passion for teaching has never waned; she continues to develop innovative curriculum and mentors early career teachers. One of her current joys is working with many teachers who are her former students.



The Emerging Educational Leadership Award

Redeemer Lutheran College This award recognises emerging leadership influence and practice and provides these educators with the opportunity to undertake professional learning in educational leadership. The award recipient/s has the opportunity to participate in funded professional learning event which will significantly inform and influence their educational leadership practice within their school setting.

Iulian Wenke is an experienced and talented teacher and educational leader who has consummate skills in innovative, authentic teaching and learning. As the Curriculum Leader of Humanities at Redeemer Lutheran College, he consistently empowers and inspires both staff and students. Julian positions teachers to strike a balance between academic rigour and the provision of engaging, meaningful learning experiences. There is an emphasis on novel but effective approaches that emphasise collaboration, empathy, critical thinking and debate. Julian's involvement in interstate and overseas learning tours has bolstered his enthusiasm for Problem-Based Learning. He has collaborated with and led his fellow departmental heads in the implementation of PBL in the middle years. Teachers in his department focus on developing interesting programs that promote purposeful learning activities and opportunities for student achievements to be displayed in a professional and inspiring manner. Dajana Zec has made a significant contribution to the education community through her work and her research for the Master of Educational Studies (Guidance, Counselling and Careers), University of Oueensland. She has shown not only exemplary leadership in her field of research but has also led teams of researchers and produced deliverables from the study to support the work of school guidance counsellors. This research has seen the production of a Guidance Resource Booklet for Secondary School Guidance Officers. Currently, Dajana is working with a research team on another systematic review of literature demonstrating the effectiveness of mental health initiatives and interventions before, during and after a disruption in Queensland schools including both man-made (e.g., violent intruders, abductions) and natural disasters (floods, fires, cyclones, pandemic). Dajana's growing recognition as an aspiring researcher in school counselling as well as her practitioner focus cements her reputation as an emerging educational leader in her field.

Mater Dei Catholic Primary School, Toowoomba Previously a biennial award, the ACELQ Executive has established this annual award to recognize the work of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander educators or teams. Recipients of this award draw on cultural knowledge, community connections and understanding of student learning needs to create experiences that build respect for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander histories and culture and enhances student outcomes.

Chris Bartlett is an indigenous man from the Lama Lama and Ayapathu mob (Far North Queensland, around Coen and to the east to Port Stewart). He has been a Principal in the Toowoomba diocese for over twenty years and is currently leading Mater Dei Catholic Primary School. His personal spirituality and selfconfidence are very reflective of his indigenous heritage. Chris is a born leader and collaborator. He knows the evidence and research around high yield pedagogical strategies. Importantly, he knows how to bring together a community of learners and has mastered the conditions that nurture collective teacher efficacy. Chris has a strong educational vision with a primary focus on the student as a learner and person. He has high expectations of everyone and a relentless focus on achieving the best outcomes for his students. Chris models the attributes of a lifelong learner and is passionate about developing and growing those around him.



The Indigenous Leadership Award

Learning Innovator (Indigenous Perspectives)

West Moreton Anglican College A MaMu woman from the Mundubarra people of the Innisfail region, Phyllis Marsh works as the Learning Innovator -Indigenous Perspectives at West Moreton Anglican College. Having built a career in the corporate world. Phyllis made a career change and began working at WestMAC, located at Karrabin on Yugara Country. Through inspired and intentional strategy Phyllis quickly established herself as a confident educational partner who promotes authentic learning through the wisdom of her First Nation's voice. Phyllis has designed and collaboratively embedded authentic First Nation's perspectives in the College's curriculum, designed Staff Professional Development, developed RISE (an in-house Women's Business Program), designed, and established the NGARI Paiabun Kurumba (Indigenous Student Leadership Program), and lead Reconciliation and connected community. The work being achieved at WestMAC is integral in strengthening relationships and building knowledge, which is the key component of the vision being realised. Phyllis is widely acknowledged for a professional skillset and approach that enriches learning and optimises student outcomes.



The Pivotal People Leadership Award



Joni Cameron

Head of English and Languages

Coombabah State High School Established in 2020, the Pivotal People Leadership Award, recognises an influential middle leader, or team of middle leaders who have been pivotal in generating enhanced learning outcomes for students from their direct and positive influence on teachers' practice.

Joni Cameron is the Head of English and Languages at Coombabah State High School. Over the two years that she has been Head of Department, she has used a range of researchbased strategies to change the culture of the department to one in which deliberate collaboration is used as a tool to enable student success. Joni's work is largely influenced by research and draws heavily on the use of data walls, case management and collaborative assessment of student work. Using these strategies, the English department has seen in improvement in the understanding of the relevant syllabus requirements as well as deep and rich conversations about students and specific strategies for success. She mentors other HODs modelling how to transform faculty culture by aligning the work of teachers - connecting curriculum planning, collaboration and inquiry cycles for effective teacher development and improved student outcomes.



The Pivotal People Leadership Award

Deputy Head of Secondary The Lakes College Madonna is an experienced educator having served in schools across state, catholic and Independent sectors for over twenty years. With a pastoral focus and interest in young people's social and emotional needs Madonna was an early adopter of Positive Psychology. As Deputy Head of Secondary at the Lakes College, Madonna knows the gradual accumulation of risks, anxieties and challenges that beset our young people. She encourages young people to identify and draw on their innate and unique character strengths to build autonomy and agency over their own lives. She has researched, devised, and embedded the College's signature Find Your North Wellbeing Program. By placing the character strengths inherent in our young people at the heart of the program, students are given the unique opportunity to seek independence and agency over their learning habits, relationships, and, ultimately, their lives. As part of the Find Your North program, Madonna leads and supports a dedicated team of Year Level Coordinators and wellbeing teachers.

Redeemer Lutheran College Claire Preston has held a variety of leadership positions in schools throughout Australia and Canada teaching Prep to Year 12 students. Her career spans Director of Music roles in a variety of school settings in Melbourne, Hobart, Toronto and most recently Brisbane where she is Head of Music at Redeemer Lutheran College. Claire has worked as Assistant Conductor of the Toronto Children's Choir and the Toronto Children's Chorus. Her passion and dedication has inspired a host of young people to enter the teaching profession and successful careers in the music industry. Her service to others includes guest lecturing for community organisations, the University of Melbourne and Griffith University, Australian Honours Ensemble Program.
