Senior Lecturer, School of Education; Program Director, UQ Learning Lab, The University of Queensland The Miller-Grassie Award and President's Citation acknowledges and perpetuates the memory of the life and work of educational researchers and administrators, Dr Laurie Miller and Associate Professor McCrae Grassie. Nominees are outstanding educational leaders, or a team, whose achievements and influence on policy and/or practice reflect the spirit of the work of the pioneering educational leaders. The recipient is widely respected in the education community and has contributed significant ideas and practice to educational leadership in Queensland.

A Senior Lecturer in Education at the University of Queensland, Dr MacMahon is Program Coordinator for the Science of Learning Field of Study, and Program Director of the UQ Learning Lab, a group of multi disciplinary researchers, educators, and industry partners who collaborate to transform learning, teaching, and training through the science of learning.

Drawing from over 20 years' experience as a P–12 educator and school leader, her work focuses on human connection and learning, and knowledge mobilisation—the translation of research into practice.

The UQ Learning Lab's Partner Schools Program has positively impacted the work of hundreds of school leaders and teachers across Australia through fostering collaboration, teachers as researchers, and bridging the research–practice gap.

Dr MacMahon has been invited to join the UNESCO Science of Learning Alliance; presented widely for educational conferences and developed strong connections and collaborations with researchers in Switzerland, USA, Japan, France, New Zealand, and Finland.

Dr MacMahon is a leader who displays great integrity and is well respected in her profession. She is very deserving of this prestigious award.

In her current role, she is focused on recruitment and retention projects for the 10,000 teachers who work as assessors and markers, ensuring that the QCAA has a robust and capable workforce and that teachers are supported in and attracted to these roles.

Research in Educational Leadership and Management Award



Professor Robin Shields

Head of School, School of Education, The University of Oueensland ACELQ promotes the principles and practices of good educational leadership through partnerships with universities and tertiary institutions. Postgraduate students are nominated by their universities for exceptional academic achievement in advanced studies in educational leadership.

Professor Robin Shields leads the University of Queensland's School of Education with impact spanning local to global contexts. His innovative data analytics examining international education networks have been adopted across five continents, influencing UNESCO and NGO policies. Having secured over \$4.8 million in grants, his research on international student migration, higher education's environmental impact, educational outcomes in South Asia, and international aid networks has shaped worldwide educational practice. At UQ, Professor Shields has implemented staff development programs aligned with Australian Professional Standards, fostering research excellence and pedagogical innovation. His award winning commitment to technological integration has been shared through mentorship programs developing educational leaders at all career stages. Most significantly, he has pioneered an approach to Indigenous leadership creating genuine partnerships with First Nations communities. By establishing collaborative spaces where Indigenous knowledge holders reshape curriculum alongside scholars, he has developed a model of respectful engagement that transforms institutions while honouring traditional knowledge systems.

She has been responsible for creating a safe and rigorous learning environment for young people who have previously been disengaged from education. In the two years of her tenure, she has grown the school from 25 to 150 students, reaching the optimal enrolment number for the Indie School model.
