# //President's Message

It is a great privilege on behalf of the Australian Council for Educational Leaders (ACEL) Board to present the 2020/21 Annual Report.

It has been another busy year for ACEL which included welcoming our new CEO, Dr Barbara Watterston who started in the role after hosting our first ever ACEL Global Educational Leadership Conference. Dr Watterston brings a wealth of knowledge and expertise to the role and is a highly respected educational leader both nationally and internationally. The ACEL Board were delighted to appoint Dr Watterston as our CEO and we are all confident that the organisation will continue to go from strength to strength though her leadership.

The 2020/21 financial year saw no shortage of challenges with the COVID-19 pandemic significantly disrupting organisations and businesses around the world. Thanks to many years of careful stewardship and diligence from successive Boards and management teams, ACEL was well placed to respond to the many challenges and continue to serve our members. Major contributors to ACEL's financial sustainability are our professional learning programs and conferences. The vast majority of these were unable to be run in a normal 'in-person' format, however, thanks to the ingenuity of the ACEL team we were able to quickly move to online offerings including for our major leadership conference. This delivered an outstanding financial result for 2020/21 with a 'breakeven' outcome which underlined the strength of the organisation and ability to successfully respond to even the toughest situation encountered for many, many years.

In 2020/21 we also farewelled two of our longest serving Board members Ms Ann McIntyre, NSW Branch President and Dr Deb Kember, QLD Branch President. Both of these wonderful educators have served as Branch Presidents and Board members for the maximum two terms, six years in total, and Ms McIntyre has also served a further period as an Independent Board member taking her to a total of nine years as an ACEL board member.

Ms McIntyre began as an Independent Director on the ACEL board, elected to the position by her peers, before being elected as NSW Branch president. During her period as an ACEL Board member she has held the positions of Chair of Publications and Chair of Professional Learning and has contributed to the success of ACEL conferences over many years. Ms McIntyre is a highly respected educator and has given so much through her commitment to the NSW Branch and ACEL nationally.

Dr Kember has held the position of Queensland Branch President for the past six year and has been a dedicated and passionate advocate for the education profession in Queensland and nationally. Dr Kember has served on a number of Board Committees during her time as Branch president and has grown the membership base in Queensland and handed over a very well-run branch that reflects the time and commitment Deb has demonstrated to the education profession in Queensland.

These are volunteer positions at both the Branch and Board level and both Ann and Deb have given freely many hundreds of hours of their time to the organisation and to the profession more broadly. I have greatly appreciated their knowledge, dedication and support during my time as President and thank them both on behalf of all ACEL members for their exceptional service.

We also say thank you to Ms Michelle McLaughlin, outgoing ACT Brand President and ACEL Board member for her service over the past three years. Ms McLaughlin has also provided passion and commitment to her role and I also recognise her service and appreciate her support.

With these long standing Branch Presidents handing over the reigns we welcomed our new State and Territory Branch Presidents, Dr Kirk Zwangobani, Dr Kylie Lipscombe and Ms Karen Fox.

Dr Kirk Zwangobani is a School Leader at Dickson College in Canberra and over his teacher career has also developed policy and projects within the ACT Education

Directorate, most recently, working closely with the ACT Board of Senior Secondary Studies in the development of 21st Century Humanities and Social Science curriculum. Dr Zwangobani's qualitative research explores the intersection of social, cultural, and education theory and how a deeper understanding of race, culture and diversity can better help us understand young people's educational and life experiences. Dr Zwangobani currently Chairs the ACT Multicultural Advisory Council advising the ACT Minister for Multicultural Affairs, is the AEL editorial board chair in 2021, and a member of ACEL's Academic Advisory Board. Dr Zwangobani was awarded an ACEL ACT Fellowship in 2019, and was a 2016 ACEL New Voice Scholar in Education Leadership research.

Dr Kylie Lipscombe is Senior Lecturer and researcher and Associate Academic Program Director of postgraduate studies in Educational Leadership at the University of Wollongong. She has 20 years' experience in educational organisations such as schools and university. Dr Lipscombe is passionate about the nexus between educational leadership and practice, and how leading impacts both teacher and student learning practices. Her program of research works closely with leaders, teachers and children in the fields of educational leadership, middle leadership, teacher collaboration, and professional learning. Dr Kylie Lipscombe is a keen contributor and leader in professional associations and is currently the academic leader of the NSW Department of Education Aspiring Principals Leadership program.

Ms Karen Fox has been elected ACEL Queensland Branch President. Having enjoyed a long career as an educator across all sectors. Ms Fox has fulfilled a number of senior leadership positions with a focus on curriculum, teaching and learning, leadership development, and more recently, in school governance. I had the great privilege of joining the team at Australian Council for Educational Leaders (ACEL) towards the end of the first quarter of 2020 in an acting CEO capacity and more recently as CEO. As a member of this national professional organisation for many years, and now as CEO, I am a strong believer in its value and acknowledge the rich and strong contribution it continues to make to the profession. ACEL, through its significant membership, has a unique point of leverage in bringing theory and practice together that includes teachers, school and system leaders and academics. To be ACEL's CEO during a significant transitionary stage as we have experienced since the onset of COVID-19 has been a rewarding and inspiring challenge.

The advent and impact of COVID-19 has tested the business model and leadership acumen of most organisations across the world including our own. Yet, the unpredictability of the current environment and variations across states and territories have provided an opportunity to explore the delivery of an expanded range of blended learning models including webinars and conferences. There is no question that the current context has been one where net income generation has been vulnerable to the challenges of responding to and living with COVID, most notably felt in the 2020-2021 financial year.

In significantly challenging times, whilst unable to host in-person events, including the national conference, ACEL experienced a surge of interest in webinars particularly in the second quarter of the financial year (end of 2020 school year). This contributed to an end of year result of (\$46,922). Given the circumstances, his was an exceedingly positive outcome.

It was due to the professionalism, dedication, and commitment of the staff in the National Office that ACEL was able to respond so effectively to the challenges of 2020 and maintain a positive and outward facing response to changing user needs. Characterised by a strong culture of collaboration amongst cross-functional teams, staff have worked creatively in

diversifying income streams (i.e., events and seeding of new programs and resources) supported by an enhanced communication strategy. Together with the guidance and expertise of the ACEL Board, the energy, passion and talent of the team in the National Office provides an empowering force to achieve our vision.

ACEL has survived and thrived for almost fifty years by responding to the needs of members and the broader educational leadership community. With a focus on recovery and renewal, ACEL will move beyond the current challenges and will continue to recalibrate and reimagine a diverse mix of online, hybrid, and in-person opportunities to support and engage our participants.

The new chapter in ACEL's strategic direction is focused on expanding and engaging more proactively with new and emerging leaders; embracing the education sector from early childhood and care to higher education, schools and systems; strengthening and expanding networks; and developing capacity to stimulate thinking, policy and practice through new strategic partnerships. It is an exciting but challenging brief particularly as we work together to build a sustainable future. To do so, I look forward to hearing from you, learning from you and enhancing our connectedness to inform educational thinking in the service of schools and our learning organisations. 

# LEADING SUCCESSFUL LEARNING IN A CHANGED WORLD

2020 ACEL Global Conference – Leading Successful Learning in a Changed World

30th September - 2nd October 2020 Online ACEL hosted three conferences during the last financial year and only one of the three was held face-to-face. The pandemic forced the cancellation of ACEL's annual conference in 2020. In its place, we held our first virtual global conference with complimentary registration as a way of supporting and thanking our members and all those who engage with ACEL. The event attracted over 3,500 delegates with 16% international delegates from countries such as New Zealand, the United Kingdom, Canada, United States of America, and Hong Kong. The conference not only increased ACEL's profile internationally but also expanded our engagement nationally. Based on feedback from delegates, the conference was an outstanding success. As two delegates said, the conference was an "excellent 3 days of thinking, reflection and talking" and another: "greatly appreciated and I'm sure it opened the eyes of many people to the quality of the ACEL conferences."

Feedback highlighted the timeliness of the conference in providing opportunities to reflect, recalibrate and renew thinking about teaching and leadership in the light of the current pandemic. This was captured by one delegate who said:

"a thirst for validation and encouragement was ever present; being able to capture a local and international audience to champion educational leaders to look optimistically at a post-COVID landscape is a most powerful change agent".

An important feature of the conference was the inclusion of student voice where students from different schools and sectors contributed to the conference at numerous touch points ensuring that their perspectives and experiences were heard and respected.

15th - 16th March 2021 Brisbane

The Disability and Inclusion conference was the only face-to-face conference held throughout the year. It took place on 15-16 March in Brisbane and was delivered in partnership with the Queensland Department of Education. As a hybrid event, it provided the opportunity for delegates not geographically close to still participate via online technologies. The event attracted over 350 delegates which was a significant increase compared to attendance of this conference in the previous year. The success of the event also prompted an opportunity to continue the partnership with the Queensland Department of Education to further delve into the area of inclusion and inclusive leadership. It was decided that the conference will be hosted in Brisbane in 2022.



2021 ACEL Early Childhood Online Conference - Leading Change to Support Child Outcomes

The third conference that was held was ACEL's Early Childhood Conference. Following a number of postponements, it was delivered as a virtual conference over 2 days featuring thought leaders such as Professors Pasi Sahlberg, Karen Thorpe and Donna Cross. The Conference highlighted the importance of the early childhood and care sector in shaping the success of every student beyond the classroom. The conference was held in partnership with the Victorian Department of Education and Training.

# //Programs

Curiosity and Powerful Learning continued with the school improvement journeys of three cohorts of schools from across New South Wales and Australian Capital Territory in 2020 - 2021. Based on original research by Professor David Hopkins, the program has been customised to suit the needs of the NSW Public School system and maintains regular interest from other states across Australia.

Participants noted that the opportunity to work with Professor Hopkins across a long period of time played a key role in allowing their schools to improve pedagogical practice and implement sound foundations for collaboration within their schools which has resulted in genuine impact within their schools and networks.

ACEL partnered with Lyn Sharratt to bring the Clarity Learning Suite to Australia in October 2020. This online program built on the learnings from Lyn's successful book Clarity – What matters most in learning, teaching and leading. Serviced over 350 participants to the middle of 2021. This unique program was popular with system leaders and school leadership teams, allowing them a fantastic opportunity to engage with Lyn and her team as well as with schools, near, far, similar and different from their own across Australia. Clarity Learning Suite's focus on "whole system" and "whole school" school improvement has seen engagement from a large, cross-sectoral group of schools from all states.

The Leading School Transformation program, led by Dr Michael Anderson and Dr Miranda Jefferson ran in Sydney in May 2021 with participants focusing on how they can implement change within their schools. Over the past 12 months, issues have continued to provide content from practitioners across Australia as well as diverse contributions from New Voice Scholars.






# //ACEL Bookshop

# //Digital & Online Content

ACEL has three key digital content streams - ACEL Resource Centre [online articles and resources], ACEL Leader's Library [Video content and podcasts], and ACEL Webinars [regular online workshops featuring leading local and international educators].

In the previous year ACEL responded to the COVID-19 impact by launching our Digital Package subscription service, granting access to 6 exclusive webinar series as well as Leader's Lounge and a year-long access to the Resources in Action publication. The success of the first series of the Digital Package in the final quarter of the last financial year had us launching a second series spanning 2020-2021 webinars. Speakers included Ron Ritchhart, Barbara Blackburn, Mary Jean Gallagher, Michael Fullan, Lyn Sharratt and Yong Zhao.



# //A Growth Story...

In the past year, Membership has continued to build across all states and territories. Institutional memberships have shown further growth, with a greater number of schools bringing their key teachers and leaders into the fold.



# //ACEL Membership

During the last financial year there has been a continued effort to increase institutional membership and grow the membership base.

An important initiative undertaken in 2021 was a review of ACEL's membership tiers. The rationale behind the review was to reconsider the existing membership model to determine if it afforded value for money for members and whether it met their current needs and contexts. An important part of the review involved reaching out to current members, former members, and non-members to find out what they would like from their membership as well as ways to improve our offerings. Another impetus for the review was not only to simplify

the current membership tiers but also to increase our reach to include, engage and support emerging leaders and thus expand ACEL's membership base. Surveys were administered to, and conversations were held with, members from Branches across the country, seeking their feedback, views and insights. Based on the review, a new set of categories of membership was developed providing greater consistency and less confusion. A three-tier model (comprising associate membership, institutional membership, and retired/student membership) was launched at the end of the financial year, highlighting ACEL's value proposition. Connecting with and listening to our members is critical, and we will continue to ensure we do so on a formal and informal basis.

# //Partnerships

ACEL has continued to partner with leading organisations in education throughout the past year. ACEL's partnership with Corwin continued to bring joint professional learning offerings, including Visible Learning, to a wide audience across Australia. The highly successful Curiosity & Powerful Learning program, in partnership with Professor David Hopkins and NSW Department of Education, brought to a conclusion a further two cohorts as well as continuing with another one. ACEL also partnered with Department of Education Queensland to showcase our successful, face to face 2021 Disability and Inclusion Conference in Brisbane. The Early Childhood Online conference ran in April 2021 in partnership with Victorian Department of Education.

ACEL's strong relationships with leading publishers and media partners has also ensured that we have continued to bring to our members and customers a range of diverse thinkers through our bookshop offerings and webinars and workshops.

Continued discussions with related industry bodies such as headspace, ESA, national and state-based principal/ professional associations and universities have allowed ACEL to identify further opportunities for future collaboration as well as remaining abreast of issues impacting the industry through a range of sources.


























### //Online and Social Media

The ACEL website continued to be improved across 2020-2021, with a focus on ease of use and integration of all ACEL communications. The homepage was upgraded to prove as a central news hub for all of ACEL's offerings and updates.

A redesigned communications strategy in 2021 saw heavy investment in ACEL's social media platforms. Our Facebook page had been refreshed and engagement rose significantly in Twitter and LinkedIn. Social posts appear almost daily all serving a wide range of pillars. These pillars ensure messaging spans across ACEL's offerings as well as providing wisdom, support, insight, thought provoking prompts, news and offering free resources. Video content and sound bites have been a new and frequent addition to social posts this year.

Direct communications through email were further streamlined to fortnightly ACEL and ACEL Member newsletters consisting of events, organisational announcements, complimentary and curated articles, and industry news. Branch Newsletters frequency has also decreased and now features more content by way of Branch Executive messages and editorials. These approaches has gathered higher engagement and community trust as we thrive to inform, promote and inspire while being non-intrusive to the digital audience.




### //Forums

ACEL branches continue to raise ACEL's profile in the profession as a premier association that supports the development of educational leadership capabilities across Australia. Over the last financial year, branches across all states and territories engaged through local forums to provide a variety of networking opportunities for members within and across branches and sectors. Due to the disruption of COVID-19, many of the branches moved their activities online due to ongoing lockdowns and the uncertainty surrounding face-to-face gatherings. The online environment brought with it increased engagement, particularly for members in rural and remote parts of the country and flexibility for those who may have been too time poor to participate otherwise. Moreover, having access to a range of recorded activities meant that members could engage where and when they chose.

Over 40 branch activities took place throughout the financial period and these ranged from Hot Topics, to Q & A forums and book clubs, to Breakfast with the Minister and State Award ceremonies. Opportunities for cross-branch collaboration and access was a positive and strategic emerging feature which will continue to build momentum and sharing of practice and expertise.





### //Journals and Publications


ACEL's journals and publications are a key component of its mission to ensure educational leaders have access to high quality resources on relevant topic matters as well as sharing current research, policy and best practice. This opportunity to share the voices of established and emerging leaders as well as researchers and practitioners is a source of great pride for the organisation. This lens into different contexts, depth of analysis and data as well as the stories of leaders and schools is a key pillar in ACEL's contribution to the health and growth of leadership in Australian education.

Australian Educational Leader (AEL) is widely considered the premier practitioner-focused publication in current circulation for educational leaders. A range of experts from Australia and overseas contribute to showcase current research, policy and practice.

Across the winter months, the team at ACEL produced two COVID-19 special editions of AEL which went out free to members. Featuring expert practitioners and theorists from across Australia and beyond, these editions served as a timely reflection on a new learning and teaching paradigm which would continue on well beyond 2020. Exploring topics of STEM in home learning, impacts on regional, rural and remote Australia, the changing nature of leadership in these unanticipated times and so much more, these two special editions provided an in-the-moment source of professional learning and reflection which was made possible through ACEL's strong connections in the educational leadership space.

Leading & Managing continues to be a well-recognised peer-reviewed journal furthering the academic discourse around educational leadership. It contains an excellent cross-section of Australian and international researchers. In 2021, ACEL have begun the process of seeking feedback on the journal to ensure it serves members and the authors who publish in it.

ACEL were also privileged to publish the 2020 Monograph by Tom Bentley and Aarushi Singhania which explored the timely topic "Leading through crisis: resilience, recovery and renewal". The 2020 New Voice Scholars continued the annual tradition of discussing how they thought education could be improved via our Perspectives online publication.





### //Australian Educational Leader

AEL is produced in-house by the ACEL team who have continued to take the journal from strength to strength. In 2021, considering member feedback and additional environmental concerns, ACEL took to an opt-in method for the physical copies of AEL, with members selecting whether they wanted to receive the journal online or in print and online.

Thematically, AEL has worked over the past 12 months to start an ongoing dialogue with members and readers around Middle Leadership and Wellbeing in addition to its ongoing cultivation of the educational leadership conversation.





We congratulated our 2020 Fellows: Sarah Broster: Sherril Duffy: Dr Rita Ellul: Joseph Favrin: Dr Peter Goss: Gerard Houlihan: Sue Harrop: William Keane: Lauren Sayer: Christopher Reed: Patricia Sweeney: and awardees Chris Wardlaw (Chair VCAA and Deputy Chair AITSL) who was awarded the Hedley Beare Educator of the Year: Dr Amanda Heffernan (Monash University) awarded the Brian Caldwell Research Award and Virginia Trioli (Journalist, Australian Broadcasting Commission) who was awarded the ACEL Victoria Media Award for accurate, impartial and informative educational reporting.

We also used this occasion to acknowledge the 2020 ACEL National Awardees from Victoria: Tracey Ezard, James Laussen, Aine Maher awarded National Fellowships: Yong Zhao, the Nganakarrawa award: and New Voice Scholars, Ray Swann, Pauline Thompson and Sarah Louise Gandolfo.

In May the first Q&A Forum for 2021 'Leadership: The Bold and the Beautiful' was held online. Panelists Fenwick English, Kate Morris, Mike De'ath and Ray Swann shared their thoughts on this provocative topic and responded to a range of interesting questions from the audience. The session was skillfully facilitated by Lauren Cook, an ACEL Victoria Branch executive and distinguished school leader.

We are very grateful to have Professor Brian Caldwell as our ACEL Patron and we honor that position every year through the annual Patron's Oration. In June, the 2021 Oration was presented by Professor Yong Zhao. Yong shared his thoughts about how this current time of disruption provides educators with an opportunity to re-imagine and invent new learning opportunities, and encouraged the audience to resist the urge to return to 'normal', mostly because it doesn't exist anymore.

The next Q&A in July was 'Re-imaging the Role of principal: Is the role too big and complex for one person?' The session was quite provocative with our 5 panellists discussing how the role of the principal has changed significantly over the past 20 years and the demands on principals from all stakeholders has dramatically increased to level that some believe is quite unsustainable. Our panellists: Tina King (A/President Australian Principals Federation): Nicole Mangelsdorf (Principal, Kilbreda College) Pitsa Binnion (Principal McKinnon Secondary College): Theresa Lincoln (Regional Leadership Consultant, Melbourne Archdiocese) and Dr Amanda Heffernan (Monash University, Education Leadership) told powerful stories with themes of hope, resilience, and belief in the enduring importance of the principal's role. The session was facilitated by branch executive Fiona Hutton who also provided words of wisdom and inspiration gained from her role as CEO of Hutton Consulting where she interacts daily with principals and aspiring principals.

The popular 'President's Research Series' was held in August where five researchers addressed the topic: The implications of the #Metoo movement on Australian schools: What do schools, educators and leaders need to know and do? Chanel Contos (Consent activist who joined the event from London), Debbie Ollis (Deakin University), George Variyan, (Monash University) Amanda Keddie (Deakin University) and Steve Roberts (Monash University) provided a lively TED talk style presentation. ACEL Victoria appreciates and nurtures our strong connection with the tertiary section.

All event this year received overwhelmingly positive feedback and attendance numbers reaffirmed their value and quality.

The 2021 Conference was originally planned to be held face to face in Melbourne, but as we quickly pivoted to an online platform, the branch took responsibility for student voice. We kicked off 2021 with a breakfast with the three Director Generals from the different education systems in WA: Valerie Gould (AISWA), Lisa Rodgers (DoE) and Dr Debra Sayce (CEWA). Very fittingly in the week of international women's day, these three inspirational leaders presented a refreshing picture of unity across boundaries when they explored the challenges and opportunities facing educational leaders in 2021. The event was recorded as an episode of the podcast EdLeaders Australia, which expanded the reach beyond the 60 participants.

In 2021 ACEL WA launched a new initiative: an educational leadership book club. Each term we choose a new book from the ACEL book shop (which promotes book sales) and then we invite leaders to attend a book club discussion at the end of term or during the school holidays. We launched in Perth and had since spawned a regional book club offshoot in the Great Southern region of WA. In total we have held five book club discussions in three locations addressing four books: "Imperfect Leadership: A book for leaders who know they don't know it all" by Steve Munby; "Nuance: Why Some Leaders Succeed and Others Fail" by Michael Fullan; "Dare to Lead" by Brené Brown; and "Ferocious Warmth: School Leaders who Inspire and Transform" by Tracey Ezard.

Our 2021 Branch Awards Ceremony in May was a huge success with our biggest turn-out yet of around 100 participants. Once again, the Minister for Education and Training, the Hon. Sue Ellery, officiated at the event which saw Lisa Rodgers, Director General at the WA Department of Education, receive the Pre-Eminent Educator of the Year award. All other awardee names can be found on the ACEL website

Another first for the WA branch was hosting a one-day Symposium on *Leading with Impact in the Early Years*, attended by 126 eager educational leaders. The Symposium was a great opportunity to hear from 20 speakers across different domains, sectors, and industries across politics, practice, policy, philanthropy, health, community, education, and research contexts. It was a true celebration of West Australian talent and demonstrating the strength of ACEL to cross boundaries to serve the educational leadership community in our state. We remain committed to this pursuit.
